Communication & Language

•Discuss the seasonal changes around us, take a learning walk to the garden and look for signs of growing.

 \cdot Talk about what they see at the farm- ask different questions. What makes all the animals different?

- •Sing rhymes and songs linked to the topic.
- •Share stories about farms/farmers.

•Discuss animals and their babies. How are they different/similar?

•Discuss initial sounds; I spy at the farm.

•Create a pond scene in an activity tray using green slime or jelly, encourage the children to use their knowledge to talk about growing. E.g., plants and animals.

•Order flowers according to size.

•Recognising one more/one less.

•Count and match spring flower number shapes.

•Provide some plant pots and artificial spring flowers on stalks. Roll a dice and place this number of flowers into the pot.

•Weighing ingredients for hot cross buns and discussing the texture of the ingredients.

•Counting Easter eggs on an egg hunt.

•Growing a bean in a bag. •Grass Head Experiment. •Making bird food. •Growing Wheat.

Physical Development

• Create a digging area where children can explore a range of garden tools, such as trowels, spades, rakes, forks, and watering cans.

•Moving in a variety of different ways both indoors and outdoors- with confidence.

•Small world area, house, farm, animals, and people.

•Building using construction equipment; build a shed/pen for the animals.

•Create actions to songs/rhymes.

Scissor skills linked to topic.

•Plant seeds and watch them grow.

•Plant and grow grass in trays for the children to cut using scissors.

Spring

Understanding the World

•Games; finding pairs, interactive. •Stick a photograph of each child's face on to a small pot. With the children, fill a pot with soil and sprinkle with cress seeds. Encourage children to observe what happens to the seeds. When the cress grows, it will resemble the children's hair.

•Make a rain measure and collect the spring rain showers. Explore the vocabulary of capacity through rain.

• Discuss new life and baby birds hatching. Observe birds in the environment and encourage children to make their own birds' nests from grass and twigs.

Talk about what plants need to grow.
Look for minibeasts and find their names using a book.

• Work in groups to achieve challenges setmotor skills, number games, sharing, turntaking.

•Talk about safety and boundaries- staying with grown-ups/ not talking to strangers •Practise handwashing.

•Discuss festivals such as Easter, encourage children to talk about their experiences.

• Role play area- into a Garden Centre. To play imaginatively- using the till/money to buy and pay for things in the shop.

•Create growing sounds using a variety of musical instruments.

·Sing rhymes related to the topic, clapping to the beat.
